### **Looking for Nominees**

t's that time, the time when nominations are open for the Long Island Authors Group (LIAG) 2015 Founder's Award. In one of his most famous speeches, President John F. Kennedy proclaimed, "Ask not what your country can do for you—ask what you can do for your country." While on a much smaller scale, we have this same concept in mind when selecting candidates, what have you done for the LIAG and the LI writing community? In every organization, there are always special people who unselfishly give of themselves while expecting nothing in return. These individuals are the ones who step forward to volunteer, or develop ideas that impact others, or give freely of their time to benefit the organization or the members themselves. Within the LIAG, we are very fortunate to have many such individuals—and this award in many ways says thank you to everyone who has done something while recognizing the special giving nature of one particular person. In addition to recognizing someone within the LIAG, the Founder's Award can be awarded to another group or organization, or an individual outside the LIAG who has in some special way, helped and assisted our organization and the LI writing community.

In the beginning of the year, the very first award went to David Axelrod. Here's an excerpt from the newsletter story I wrote about David's amazing contributions that earned him the 2014 LIAG Founder's Award: "By selecting David Axelrod as the recipient of the first award in 2014, the LIAG Board has chosen an individual who epitomizes this award's spirit. David is perfectly suited to receive this award for many reasons. His curriculum vitae could fill the pages of this newsletter, but here are some highlights of his accomplishments that reflect his giving side.

From the very beginning, David had been supportive of the idea of a Long Island Authors Group and was one of the original 16 authors who participated in the very first LIAG book fair in 2008. He helped establish our first board of directors and served on the board from its inception through 2010. During that time, David generously allowed the LIAG to receive non-profit status through his own non-profit organization, Writer's Unlimited Agency while our own application was pending.

Over the years, David has provided guidance and advice to each LIAG President on many issues as our organization went through its growing pains. He single-handily developed the concept for our First Wednesdays' meetings, and took the time to scout and locate a suitable setting. David coordinated those first meetings and recruited LIAG member Suzanne Litrel as the First Wednesdays' meeting

### **Have Book Reviews Lost Their Power?**

used to jump for joy each time I received another five star review. And then one day, I got my comeuppance when a dear friend posted a four star review on my newest book. True, she included some complimentary commentary, but why only four stars? Where did I fall short?" Next time we spoke I swallowed my pride and asked, "What do you think I should have done differently for that book to have merited five stars?" Her answer really got me thinking:


"You know, when I wrote my first full length novel, in a matter of months twenty-seven people had posted five star Amazon reviews. I was elated. That was while I was in my first blush as a new author. But later I realized that all those stars were part of a popularity contest. Friends and colleagues were pulling for me to succeed and it embarrassed me. There are so many really fine books published these days by both Indie and traditionally published authors, but five stars? I give out very few five star review these days. The book has to be near perfection for me to do that. But I try to convey through the context of my review how I feel about the book. Your book is terrific. I mean that sincerely, and I said so in my review. But five stars? I save those five star reviews for books like James Joyce's Ulysses or D.H. Lawrence's Sons and Lovers."

With that conversation stored in my memory bank, I began to rethink the whole idea of book reviews. Perhaps my friend was right and we should start rating books more realistically. And If we all agreed to do that, would book reviews lose their power? I think not, but only if we all began to approach them with a different mindset. Maybe the time is ripe for us to stop commenting on the number of stars we receive and instead start quoting an excerpt from the review itself. Some reviewers are tougher than others,

so star counts are not the definitive answer. But positive comments are and they spur us on, encouraging us to keep working on our craft, while honest, thoughtful critiques help us grow as authors.



co-coordinator. And even though the location of the meetings has moved, we honor David each time we walk through the doors of the Bonwit Inn and take our places at the table.

He has also been, and continues to be instrumental in shaping our membership standards, and has served on the Membership Committee for all the years we have had one. And amazingly, even though he is now retired from his teaching position at Suffolk Community College, and has since moved to Florida, David continues to serve as a LIAG Membership Committee application book reader and a valued advisor. All of this without asking for anything in return—plus, even though he moved he still pays his annual dues in support of our organization.

> But wait, there's much more. David is a three-time Fullbright Scholar, and the only American to win the award back-to-back in

two separate categories. With his third award, David was the first official Fullbright Poet-in-Residence in the People's Republic of China. Meanwhile back at home on LI, he held the post of Professor of English at a Long Island community college. During his tenure, David not only established the creative writing curriculum, but created a visiting writer's program that brought hundreds of authors to Long Island to perform. Over a period of 40 years, David taught writing to an estimated 12,000 college students. Even now in Florida, he has established mentoring programs and continues to be an influence to the LIAG and the writing community wherever he happens to live. And let's not forget he was awarded, and carried out with distinction, the office of the Suffolk County Poet Laureate from 2007 -2009."

Now, the nominating committee is asking all current LIAG members to consider an individual (or organization) who might win the award for 2015. What is the LIAG Founder's Award? While called the LIAG Founder's Award, it is not named after any one person, but instead reflects an innovative, creative, and giving spirit. It can be awarded as an honor, or in recognition of someone's unselfish giving, or for the work they do (or have done), or for someone who has made a difference, or... for all of the above. While it is designed to be awarded annually, it doesn't have to be if no appropriate candidate is recognized. It is awarded for the prior year; it can be for any year of service. In many ways, just being nominated is an award because it

The deadline for candidates is December 15, 2014. From this group, the nominating committee (the first 4 LIAG Presidents) will select the best candidates and submit these names to the LIAG membership for a final email vote. The winner will be notified and the award will be presented at the March First Wednesdays' meetina.

#### AROUND HUNTINGTON VILLAGE

ounded in 1653, the town of Huntington is situated on what is known as the Gold Coast of Long Island. The incorporated villages within the town are Huntington Bay, Lloyd Harbor, Asharoken, and Northport. Huntington has always attracted a population that has created a foundation of diversity. Settlement-era properties, castles of the Victorian period, and main streets still adorn the town as witnesses of the people who lived here and a community that is still thriving. A few of the castles and mansions that once existed in the town have disappeared, some by wear and tear and others through neglect. Still others have been converted into academic institutions and museums. Around Huntington Village shares photographs that give meaning to the events in the lives of the people who lived here.





Bringing Literature to Life Through Creative Dramatics.






### Roland Allnach Returns to Cynthia Brian's 'Starstyle' to Discuss His Book, 'Prism'





ore than five decades prior to writing an inspiring and engaging book, In Sickness and In Health: A Memoir of Love." Joe **Satriano** was born into a traditional Italian Catholic family who lived in Brooklyn, New York. After high school, he went to Brooklyn College and earned a master's degree in math education.

While attending Brooklyn College, Joe met an attractive young Jewish woman named Susan who was also studying to be a math teacher. After graduation, Joe and Sue married, moved to Oceanside, New York, and shared life together until she died of a 13-year battle with breast cancer in 2006.

Until he decided to give up his career to care for his wife, Joe taught math to high school students for almost 30 years. In recognition of outstanding service to Roslyn High School, the board of education granted him early retirement.

Joe and Sue had two sons: Matthew and Justin. Despite the challenges they faced during their mother's illness, both were great students. Matthew graduated

from Princeton University and Berkeley and is currently employed as a PhD in mathematics teaching and doing research at the University of Michigan. His younger brother, Justin, received a bachelor's degree in computer science from Brown University upon his graduation in 2011.

In 2006, Joe started the Susan Satriano Memorial Scholarship Foundation in honor of his wife. The non-profit organization awards college scholarships to high school seniors, or as he refers to them, the "Silent Sufferers", who have had a parent die of cancer or who have a parent currently battling the disease. The Foundation, which receives proceeds from sales of the book and accepts tax-deductible donations, has already helped over 700 students across the country with scholarships totaling in excess of \$400,000. Since it is a "Mom and Pop" organization, 100% of the proceeds collected go directly back to students to defray the large expenditures of a college education. Joe's hope is that one day, as recognition of the Foundation increases it can reach out and help every "Silent Sufferer".

Joe presently gives motivational and humorous book talks and is in the midst of writing his second book, a sequel. The focus of the new book is about how he and his boys are dealing with Sue's death and how they are able to somehow move forward to lead very productive lives. Knowing that both Joe and Sue were High School math teachers, the title of the book just had to be... After Math: Life Without Sue. Please visit:
